Strengthen our commitment to bear witness to those whose lives have been ravaged by disasters, whether it happened 20 years ago or just yesterday. May we accompany one another through our darkest days, just as you accompany us. Restore our faith in the magnitude of your grace and the healing mercy of even our human efforts to repair what has been broken. Allow us to join you in restoring streets with dwellings to reflect your enduring love and abiding spirit.
